FLNRORD and the Ministry of Indigenous Relations and Reconciliation (MIRR) are in the early days of reviewing policies, programs, and legislation to determine how to bring the principles of the commitment into action in BC. 11:00 am – 12:00 pm	<p>Session 5 Wildfire – Science, Risks and Management Panel</p> <p>Today BC is experiencing evacuations due to floods from spring melt and heavy rains. But the very real risk of wildfire is never out of the minds of community forests and rural BC communities. This 3-hour session, with a 45-minute break for lunch, will be all about fire. The 4-person panel will take us through the experience of an evacuee from the Williams Lake fires, the science of fire and its role in the ecosystem, the indicators and factors that have contributed to our current situation of insect outbreaks and fire risk, to stories of challenges and successes in the mitigation of risk. The session will include an hour for discussion after the presentations. The local community has been invited to join us.</p> <p>Brian McNaughton, BC Federation of Woodlot Association, General Manager Brian is a long-time resident of Williams Lake. Brian will share his first-hand experience as an evacuee from the 2017 fires in the Cariboo and his perspective of how the 2017 season of catastrophic fires developed over time.</p> <p>Lori Daniels, Professor, UBC Department of Forest and Conservation Sciences Lori’s research investigates the impacts of natural and human caused disturbance and climate variation on forests. She will show how research on fire regimes helps to understand the causes and consequences of the 2017 wildfires. She will share the results from a 2016-7 survey on community wildfire protection and pose science-based solutions for long-term forest and community resilience – including proposed research collaboration with community forests in BC.</p>

12:45 pm – 2:45 pm	<p>Session 5, continued</p> <p>Stephan Martineau – Manager of SIFCo – the Slocan Integral Forestry Co-Op, in the Slocan Valley.</p> <p>SIFCo Community Forest has been leading the way when it comes to licensee engagement in Wildfire Management since 2008. Stephan will talk about their Strategic Landscape Level Wildfire Protection Plan, how they went about creating it, and some of the challenges they see ahead as this type of work gets scaled province wide. He will present some of the tools they have used, examples of the</p>

	<p>different types of treatments they are applying in the landscape, and how they have gained social licence to do this work.</p> <p>Bruce Blackwell RPF, RPBio, BA Blackwell and Associates “Fuel is the only thing we can affect when it comes to fire.” Bruce will talk about the need to invest in fire preparedness and prevention along with a need to review policy and legislation, stumpage and the tenure system so government and industry can better coordinate forest fire management.</p> <p>Q&A and Discussion</p>
