Introduction

As a member of the BCCFA you are asked to participate in the 4th annual survey of the tangible social, cultural, economic and environmental benefits that community forests bring to their communities and to the province. We have sought out the most common, universal and easy to measure indicators that can be applied regardless of governance structure or ecosystem to show the provincial impact of the Community Forest Agreement (CFA).

Important Information on the Survey - Please Read Carefully

- The Indicators questions are targeted to CFAs with a full fiscal year of operations completed. If you are a member without a CFA, please skip the Indicators questions and go directly to The Members Information section and answer the questions which apply to your situation.
- For ease of compilation, answer only the question asked in any given cell. If the question asks for a number (2), provide the number, do not spell it out (for example we want you to write a 2 not two). Do not add additional information in a cell. We have tried to design the survey to force numerical responses with no decimals, so be forewarned and plan to round off your answers! We want your comments. Please put them in the space at the end of each section.
- All responses to the survey will be amalgamated to demonstrate the collective story of the immense benefits CFAs provide. Information received from individual CFAs will be kept confidential unless a CFA agrees to share specific information.
- You can come back to the survey over repeated sessions as long as you are using the same computer and browser each time.
- Most of the questions make a reference to the reporting year. The reporting year is your most recently completed fiscal year.
- Stories are at the heart of who we are and what we do. Along with providing data, you are asked to provide a few stories about how your community forest creates local benefits. Story telling captures some important messages that need to be told about community forests and to really show their local impact. Consider telling a story that links to each of the categories of objectives. There is also room to tell a good story at the end of the Indicators questions.
- Following the the questions on the 18 Indicators, you are asked to respond to questions that will support the ongoing planning and advocacy efforts of the BCCFA. Additionally, there is an opportunity to make a pitch for the Robin Hood Memorial Award of \$10,000.
- Please do the best you can to provide responses to the survey questions. You may not be able to answer them all because you need more time to collect data, or simply the data is not available. Your effort to complete as much as possible is appreciated. When necessary to make an estimate,

Indicator #1: Number of Jobs

How this indicator links to the objectives

A. Community forests provide economic benefits to their communities and to the province of British Columbia.

Rationale - Why we need this indicator

This question is one of the most important in conveying the benefits of community forests. PLEASE make sure you answer as completely as possible. This data allows us to calculate how many jobs/m3 community forests create in forestry, logging and support services. We use the data in Indicator 6 (Log Sales) to calculate jobs/m3 on the milling side. Therefore, it is equally important that you respond as completely as possible to Indicator 6. Together they help us reliably report on job creation and employment in comparison with the rest of the industry.

Local employment in rural communities is one of the primary benefits of community forests. This indicator measures the total direct employment & contract labour generated by community forests in relationship to the harvest volume allocated to community forests.

Methodology

You are being asked to report on:

- The total # of workers with the community forest during the reporting year in each category.
- 2. The total number of hours for workers in each category.
- 3. The # of m3 harvested in the reporting year
- 4. AAC Annual Allowable Cut

Instructions

The number of workers and number of hours will be asked in two separate questions. Your total number of workers and total hours of all workers reported will include hours of direct, contracted and any subsidized employment. Your calculations should include all administration, log harvesting, silviculture, recreation and botanicals, and other categories that you may consider important. It may be necessary for community forest managers to ask their contractors to provide estimates.

Calculations & Analysis

One "Full Time Equivalent" (FTE) is equal to 1820 hours per year. This indicator will measure both the number of jobs per year & the number of jobs per cubic metre. When members report on the number of employment hours, the BCCFA will be able to report on the average number of FTEs per m3 of community forest volume, and to make a comparison with the rest of the industry.

Indicator #2: Total Economic Activity

Indicator Linkage to Objectives:

A. Community forests provide economic benefits to their communities and to the province of British Columbia

Rationale

As long-term area-based tenures, community forests support community economic development and contribute to diversification of rural communities. The total annual cost of sales and expenditures is an indicator of the total economic activity generated by the community forest.

Methodology

You are being asked to provide the total value in dollars of sales and expenditures made by your community forest in the reporting year.

Instructions

The value of sales and expenditures should be available on the annual income statement of the community forest. This figure represents total operating expenses and includes fixed and production costs, including things like debt financing.

Calculations & Analysis

The BCCFA will tally your results and report on the collective economic activity of community forests in BC, and calculate an average expenditure per m3.

Indicator #3: Community Contributions

Rationale

The cash and in-kind contributions made by the community forest are an important indicator of the local economic benefits generated by the community forest In many cases, these contributions serve social objectives, in addition to economic ones.

Methodology

You are being asked to report:

- 1. The total cash contributed to the community through grants, infrastructure improvements, special projects etc. in the past year.
- 2. The total in-kind contributions to the community measured in dollars.

Instructions

Tally the total cash contributions made by your community forest in the reporting year. Next, tally the total of in kind contributions for all projects and activities, estimated in dollars. For example donation of 3 hours of machine time to a community project can be calculated using the going rate for the piece of equipment. Likewise the dollar amount for volunteer time (including that of your board) can be estimated by using an average community wage.

This indicator will show how CFA funds are used to leverage additional funds for community priorities. As with Indicator #3, in often these projects serve social objectives, in addition to economic ones.

Indicator #6: Distribution of Log Sales

Indicator Linkage to Objectives:

A. Community forests provide economic benefits to their communities and to the province of British Columbia.

Rationale

Community forests supply wood on the open market to major industry, and also to small and medium sized mills and value added manufacturers. In doing so, they strive to support the full spectrum of milling and manufacturing facilities. This indicator will provide updated information on the distribution of log sales that can be tracked over time. This year the mill type categories have been redefined to ask respondents to provide detail on sales to those categories and the associated volume. With this data we will be able to use the standard employment coefficients for each category to generate more facts on the employment benefits of community forest logs (links back to indicator #1). This is important because the number of jobs/m3 shows the value, in terms of employment, of the harvest volume allocated to community forests.

The Province has identified priorities to reduce carbon emissions and increase utilization of lower quality fibre. You are asked to describe your efforts to reduce burning and increase utilization. Additionally data on involvement and or interest in markets for waste or residue will identify community forest engagement in new markets.

Methodology

Survey respondents will report:

- 1. The volume of sales to mills in each of the categories, based on the annual log input of a mill/manufacturing facility as described below.
- 2. Your involvement and or interest in markets for wood waste.
- 3. Your activities to increase utilization and reduce burning.

Indicator #7: Investments in Intensive Silviculture

Indicator Linkage to Objectives:

A. Community forests provide economic benefits to their communities and to the province of British Columbia

Rationale

As long-term, area-based tenures, community forest agreements create strong incentives for investment in the future. This indicator will measure investments in the future economic return of the forest. By measuring the investments in intensive silviculture that are incremental to legal requirements, we can demonstrate efforts to increase the growing capacity in community forest, with the intent of increasing the AAC.

Methodology

You are being asked to report:

- 1. The total value, in dollars, of the community forest's investment in intensive silviculture, incremental to legal requirements in the listed categories. Respondents will report the total treatment cost, including planning, development, and administration of these projects.
- 2. The number of hectares treated.
- 3. Brief description of the incremental activities.

Instructions

You will report separately on work paid for by the community forest, and work paid for with outside sources such as the Land Based Investment Program: Forests For Tomorrow.

Indicator #8: Economic Diversification

Indicator Linkage to Objectives:

A. Community forests provide economic benefits to their communities and to the province of British Columbia

Rationale

One of the provincial objectives for the community forest program is to diversify the use of and benefits derived from the community forest agreement area. The CFA tenure is one of only two forest tenures in BC that has the right to develop and manage Non Timber Forest Resources (NTFRs). Section 43.3 of the Community Forest Legislation through the Forest Act gives rights to harvest and collect fees for NTFRs.

The indicator will show the degree to which community forests are generating revenue from sources other than timber. These include botanical forest products and other prescribed products (such as carbon credits) as listed in Schedule C of the Community Forest Agreement Licence. While little development has occurred in this realm to date, this indicator will provide baseline data.

Methodology

You are being asked to report:

1. The total value in dollars of revenue from diversified sales for the reporting period.

Report the total value in dollars of revenue from diversified sales for the reporting period including all products for which the CFA holder has the authority to manage according to Schedule C of the Agreement.

Indicator #9: Community Accountability

Indicator Linkage to Objectives:

B. Community forests provide social benefits to their communities and to the province; they promote community involvement and participation and forest worker safety.

Rationale

One of the elements of community forests that set them apart from other forest tenures is their accountability to their local communities. This accountability is the cornerstone of local decision-making. In community forestry, management decisions are made by those who have to with live the outcomes. When local people have a hand in management of the forests adjacent to their rural communities, they are more likely to be innovative in the integration of multiple values in their decision-making. This indicator measures whether the community forest reports out annually to its community on its progress towards objectives as identified in the Community Forest Agreement Management Plan.

- 2. The number of formal agreements with community organizations and user groups in place in the reporting year.

Indicator #11: Investments in Community Education

Indicator Linkage to Objectives:

B. Community forests provide social benefits to their communities and to the province; they promote community involvement and participation and forest worker safety.

Rationale

Community forests provide an opportunity to link community members to the forest, and to increase their understanding of forest ecosystems and management. As long-term, area-based tenures, community forests provide enhanced opportunities for education and research. Community forests can be laboratories for testing innovative forest practices. This indicator measures the investments the community forest is making in education and capacity building.

Methodology

You are being asked to report:

- 1. Number of hours spent on coordination and delivery of educational activities in the community in the reporting year.
- 2. The total value, in dollars, of all community forest investments in education in the reporting year.
- 3. Your involvement in a K-12 educational program for the National Forest Week data base.

Instructions

You are being asked to include the time spent by community forest staff, contractors, employees and volunteers on all educational activities in the reporting period. This includes school presentations, field trips, public events, as well as training supported by the community forest (such as first aid, faller certification etc).

Rationale

One of the most significant benefits of community forests are the investments the organization makes in creating, improving and maintaining recreational infrastructure and opportunities. This indicator will measure the value of the cash and in-kind investments in recreation that the community forest has made.

Methodology

You are being asked to report:

- 1. The estimated cash and in-kind investments in recreation features in the reporting year.
- 2. The total number of kilometres of trail built or maintained in the reporting year by the community forest, or by a partner organizations with dollars contributed by the community forest.

Indicator #13: Proactive Management of Wildfire Hazard

Indicator Linkage to Objectives:

- A. Community forests provide economic benefits to their communities and to British Columbia.
- B. Community forests provide social benefits to their communities and to the province; they promote community involvement and participation and forest worker safety.
- D. Community forest management is consistent with sound principles of environmental stewardship that reflect a broad spectrum of values.

Rationale

The combined effects of climate change, the mountain pine beetle, past management increasing forest fuels and the province's limited fire suppression capacity are leading to an increase in wildfire incidence and severity. Community forests are situated in the interface between communities and wild forest lands, and are uniquely positioned to serve as a leader in the coordination and management of these areas to reduce the risk of catastrophic wildfire.



This indicator will measure the breadth and depth of First Nations involvement in the community forest. It will serve to demonstrate how effective community forest organizations are at working with the First Nation within whose territory the community forest is located.

Indicator Linkage to Objectives:

D. Community forest management is consistent with sound principles of environmental stewardship that reflect a broad spectrum of values.

Rationale

Community forests, by their design, must integrate the values of the communities that manage them. This unique model of forest management sees CFA managers gaining the social license to operate in highly constrained areas that have not been previously accessible due to local values. And, while taking all that into consideration, they also comply with the tenure regulations and Acts of British Columbia.

Methodology

You are being asked to report:

- 1. The total number of hectares in the Community Forest Agreement area.
- 2. The number of hectares within the community forest that are considered sensitive.
- 3. The number of hectares within the community forest that are considered sensitive and operable.
- 4. The number of hectares of sensitive areas within the community forest that have been treated prior to the reporting period.

Questions 1-4 are likely to be a onetime measure, updated periodically if there is new information. Question 5 will be updated annually.

Instructions

You are being asked to use Vegetation Resources Inventory (VRI) data or better. The questions are designed to differentiate the areas where no forestry can occur from areas where modified management practices can occur.

Sensitive areas are defined as: domestic and community watersheds; riparian areas; visually sensitive areas ('preservation', 'retention', and 'partial retention' VQO's--not 'modification' VQO); 'potentially unstable' and 'unstable' terrain (Terrain Class IV and V); areas with archaeological values or cultural heritage (e.g., per Archaeological Overview Assessments); identified/critical wildlife habitat (e.g. ungulate winter range, wildlife habitat areas, caribou habitat, anything covered by a GAR order); fisheries sensitive watersheds; (buffers on) recreation trails and sites; areas identified as sensitive by the community.



Log Sales

Most community forests generate revenue from the sale of logs and not from processing them. Large forest companies are focused on harvesting the species and log types that best meet their mill or market requirements. Community forest managers focus on marketing the full spectrum of species and logs available on their land base to a range of customers. By de-linking the woodlands from the major manufacturers each log finds its best market and end use. This leads CFA holders to consider all forest values and to find ways to diversify their operations, working to capture more value for the wood harvested.

The Robin Hood Memorial Award for Excellence in Forestry

In 2016, the MFLNRORD created an award that is given annually to the community forest that best exemplifies the values exhibited by the late Robin Hood and the goals and values of community forestry in BC. The first recipient of the \$10,000 award was the Likely-Xats'ull Community Forest. In 2017, the Harrop-Procter Community Forest was the winner of the award.
