

- Objectives set by government
 - Land Use Orders, GAR
- FSPs
 - Results and Strategies
 - Stocking Standards
- Site Plans
- Practice requirements
- Hazard abatement requirements

What do we need to enable a new paradigm?

- Spatial Landscape
 Objectives
 - Community Wildfire
 Protection Plans
 - Landscape planning initiatives
 - Ecosystem restoration
 - Wildfire recovery
 - Etc.





What tools do we need to enable a new paradigm?

- Innovative and costeffective tools for hazard reduction
 - Prescribed fire
 - Fibre utilization





What tools do we need to enable a new paradigm?

- Wildfire objectives that apply to all tenure holders
 - Forthcoming changes to legislation
- Appropriate cost recognition
- Community involvement and recognition of shared responsibility

Immediate Opportunities

FSP's


- Maximize innovation opportunities in results and strategies
- Landscape Values (OGMA, MDWR, Visual Quality, Recreation etc.)
- Identified on the landscape to reflect societal and ecological values
 - Not going away
- Use the guidance and exemption processes where appropriate

- Stocking Standards
 - Important to recognize fire resiliency in both species and distribution
 - Link to Timber Supply is important but there is flexibility allowed to address other values
 - Maximum Density should reflect management objectives


- Mindful Site Plans and Prescriptions
 - Build every prescription with a maintenance schedule
 - May take more than one entry to restore stands
 - Include future options such as prescribed burning
 - Use the existing guidance and exemption processes to address key values at the site level
 - Work with districts to identify innovative treatment options and areas where guidance cold be improved



- Use existing tools and guidance to build prescriptions
 - ABCFP Fire and Fuel
 Management Guidelines
 - Hazard abatement guidelines
 - Tool for FuelManagement Website



- Utilize External Funding Sources
 - FES, FFT, HCTF, CRI etc.
 - Planning activities to incorporate multiple values



- Modification of practices to incorporate resiliency
 - Even small changes can make a difference



- Build upon existing knowledge
 - First Nations and community input
 - Prescribed burning practices
- Embrace innovation
- Share information and Celebrate Successes
