FESBC Purposes

The purposes of the Society as laid out in its Constitution are:



Accomplishments to Date

February 2016 to June 2022



FESBC by the Numbers:

- \$238 Million approved funding for projects
- 263 Projects across BC
- \$363 Million in economic activity
- 2,100 Full-time equivalent jobs created
- 63 projects led by First Nations
- 4.2 Million tonnes CO2e sequestered or avoided (904,000 cars off the road for a year)



Community Forests to Date

February 2016 to June 2022

FESBC has funded:

- 25 Community Forests
- 53 Projects across BC
- Over \$18 Million
- \$12.3 Million for 34 Wildfire risk reduction projects
- \$5.9 Million for 19 projects reducing greenhouse gases, increasing fibre utilization and rehabilitating damaged forest stands



Community Forests New Approvals

August 2022

FESBC Board recently approved funding for wildfire risk reduction for:

- 12 Community Forests
- 17 Projects across BC
- \$11.7 Million
- And potentially more to be approved soon.



FESBC Supporting the Province

FESBC is aligned with Government's Priorities:

- Fund projects to reduce wildfire risk to communities
- Optimize the recovery and utilization of low-value residual fibre resulting from WRR treatments
- Coordinate and assist with other funding programs:
 - UBCM FireSmart Community Funding and Supports Program
 - BCWS –Crown Land Wildfire Risk Reduction Program
 - BC Community Forest Association Wildfire Risk Reduction 21/22 Funding
- Ensure treatments align with land manager priorities and standards
- Work collaboratively with MOF Regional Operations and BC Wildfire Service
