Confidentiality

All responses to the survey will be amalgamated to tell the collective story of the immense benefits CFAs provide. Information received from individual CFAs will be kept confidential unless a CFA agrees to share specific information.

Reporting Year

Most of the questions make a reference to the reporting year. The reporting year is your most recently completed fiscal year. It is important to stick with this time frame in all of your responses. Do not switch to a different time frame, for example, a calendar year. We know that for some of you this requirement makes your data and stories seem like old news. We encourage you to report on more current stories and photos but keep your data to the last full fiscal year.

Follow the instructions for each question and do the best you can Your effort to complete as much of the survey as possible is appreciated. Please do the best you can to provide responses to each of the survey questions, particularly Indicators 1 and 6. Educated estimates or ballpark numbers are acceptable. When making an estimate, please err on the side of caution. It is important that we don't inflate our data. To help with survey compilation please enter "0" if you did not make an investment when asked. This will help us distinguish between zero investment, and an answered question.

You can come back to the survey at any time.

You must click NEXT at the bottom of the page, to save your data in Survey Monkey. If you press next and the survey does not forward to the next page, then you have incorrectly entered some information. You may have added a \$ sign or a m3 or entered text that the survey question will not allow. To help us in the compilation of survey responses, we ask that you enter numbers only.

The survey is extensive.

If you are being timed out or the browser you are using is not able to support the survey, we recommend using Google Chrome as your browser. If you are having problems, clear your cache and cookies, since that will act as a reset and usually fixes things. The steps to clear cache and cookies are slightly different depending on the browser you're using. Each browser has great instructions for this in their help centre.

Stories and Photos

Stories are at the heart of who we are and what we do. To truly explain the full benefits of community forests to decision-makers and the public, we need the stories and photos that best describe your work and the positive, local impacts of your community forest. Tell us the stories that are important to you, even if they are about events or activities that did not take place in the reporting year. We need a rich collection of photos to accompany the stories for the Indicators Report, so send Susan your pictures of minimum 1MB quality. You have two options for writing up your stories. Option 1 is to put them right in the survey at the end of each indicator. Option 2 is to focus on the data in the survey and write up your stories in the separate Stories Template document.

3. Indicator #1: Number of Jobs

Instructions

In Indicator 1 we are asking: "What were the total number of workers and number of hours that were generated by the community forest in the reporting year in each of the categories below?"

It is of utmost importance to estimate <u>all components</u> of the land base activity so that we have as complete a data set as possible. We understand this is the most

onerous indicator to answer, but it is also our most important data when combined with your response to Indicator 6 because it helps us to calculate jobs created by community forests in comparison to the rest of the industry. Remember that educated estimates are acceptable. Having data on the jobs/m3 created by community forests is of critical importance in our advocacy efforts.

In this indicator you will report on:

- 1. The total # of workers with the community forest during the reporting year in each category.
- 2. The total number of hours for workers in each category.
- 3. The number of metres harvested in the reporting year.
- 4. AAC Annual Allowable Cut
- 5. The total number of volunteer hours on your CFA which includes board, staff, contractors and community partners and members.

The number of workers and number of hours will be asked in two separate questions. Your total number of workers and total hours of all workers will include staff (direct), contracted and any subsidized employment. This includes workers that are run through the community forest books and contracted crews.

In this Indicator we measure both the number of jobs per year & the number of jobs per metre. When members report on the number of employment hours, the BCCFA will be able to report on the average number of Person Years (PYs) per metre of community forest volume, and to make a comparison with the rest of the industry. The survey references "Person Years" (PYs). This is the 4th year we have used PYs, and it replaces "Full Time Equivalent" used in previous reports. In accordance with BC Stats, one PY is equivalent to 1750 hours.

We also know that in community forestry, many volunteer hours contribute to the successful operation of community forests that are not accounted for in contracts, wages and budgets. The volunteer hours that you report will help to inform BCCFA policy advocacy efforts, including tab rates discussions. Please estimate the total number of volunteer hours contributed by your board, staff, contractors and community partners and members to make the licence successful and meet the <u>8</u> goals of the community forest program.

Trail building and maintenance: Trail building and maintenance in the community forest	
Specialty consulting: Include services purchased that are typically not done by the forest manager and include engineering, hydrological assessment, biologists, and other consultants hired to support community forest work.	
Botanical collection: Plant harvesting including berries, mushrooms, greens, oils, boughs, bark, and others

Community forests primarily supply wood on the open market to major industry and to small and medium sized mills and value added manufacturers. In doing so, they contribute to the diversification of manufacturing while supporting small and medium sized mills. We support this diversity because it creates more economic resiliency and greater benefits for communities.

The data from this question will be linked with the responses from Indicator #1. You must answer both Indicator 1 and 6 to help us get the data to report on jobs. We will then use the standard BC employment coefficients for each mill category to generate more facts on the employment benefits of community forest logs in comparison to the rest of the industry.

The BCCFA would like to better understand how our members are marketing their logs and to learn about any multi-year arrangements with the major mills in their area. Some of you may feel reluctant or uncomfortable to disclose sensitive information about your markets.
